RHS UPDATE ... a progress report



It has been a busy year for the six volunteers studying for the RHS Level 1 Award in Practical Horticulture. The students have been continually assessed on a range of horticultural tasks with written and practical assignments. With just one term to go, they are well on their way to completing the course by Easter 2019.

'It's been great to watch the improvement.' says course tutor Helen Marshall. 'It's not just the development of their horticultural skill that impresses but their growing levels of confidence, and as a group, they are incredibly supportive.'

In October, five more students from Chestnut and Cherry Tree were enrolled for the Level 1 Award. One student remarked: 'The course promises I'll leave feeling better than when I arrived. I arrived feeling rubbish; now I feel energised. And, I've learned things too!'

Over the winter period, students will explore more of the syllabus with topics such as soil testing, vegetative propagation and dealing with bare root material.

SWOP teamed up with Kingston Maurward College at the start of the year to become their first satellite centre for RHS training. 'We are really grateful to the college for all their help and guidance,' says Helen 'and we look forward to developing more learning opportunities in the future.' So far, it's a 10/10 for progress!

CHERRY TREE EVENTS

It's been a busy summer in and out of the nursery.

In June we had a stand at the inaugural FlowerFest 18 in the grounds of the Red House Museum in Christchurch. It was great to meet new people and be part of this event.

FlowerFest 19 will be between 14-16th JUNE 2019.

There was also a display by our Volunteers, in conjunction with Kingston Maurward College, about the RHS level 1 Award in Practical Horticulture course, showing off what they had done so far and how the course is benefiting them.

Our Volunteers really appreciate your support on not only these event days but also every time you visit; all proceeds


go towards our Volunteers welfare.








CHESTNUT NURSERY UPDATE

2018 was always going to be a busy year here at Chestnut, with the build due to start in June. However, the 'Beast from the East', followed by a prolonged cold spell, prompted us to make the decision to postpone the build until September. The late start to the season, coupled with the hottest summer anybody could remember, meant that we had a hugely successful season with our highest sales figures ever! Thank you to all of our customers, regulars and new, who have supported









The busy season also kept our Volunteers busy — working in the shop, potting up and caring for the plants as well as all-day daily watering! As we had to completely clear the Nursery site, we started our Clearance Sale on 18th August — this was our biggest ever sale, the shop (as it was then) was full of queues with three tills working flat out to try and keep things moving. Hundreds of people came through the doors during the day and nearly everybody left with at least one bargain — some had many bargains packed into trolleys. Our thanks go to our stalwart 'Friends' who barely had a chance to draw breath on the day — we couldn't have done it without them!

Over the remainder of August we managed to sell just about everything and by the end of August had managed to empty our potting shed, workshop and plant storage areas in readiness.

We have been lucky to be able to have a 'pop-up shop' for the duration of the build, thanks to the Dolphin Centre. The shop, staffed by our Volunteers and Friends, is situated in Kingland Crescent, just past Specsavers and opposite Waves, and sells houseplants and gifts, jams, chutneys and local honey and a selection of outdoor plants.

Those Volunteers who do not work in the shop have been travelling over to our sister nursery, Cherry Tree, with Andy and Netta accompanying them. Whilst there they have been helping with nursery maintenance, clearing and tidying. Cherry Tree runs a RHS Horticultural course which two of our Volunteers were chosen to participate in. At the end of the course (assuming that they pass!) they will gain a RHS Level 1 Award in Practical Horticulture. We still managed to hold two of our annual favourite events -Fish and Chip day was due to take place in March but had to be cancelled due to the weather conditions, so we held it on our last day at the Nursery before the build started, on 31st August. In June, we held our BBQ, supported by the Bank of New York, whose staff cooked and served a feast for all our Volunteers and Friends on a very hot and sunny day. Our thanks go to them for all their help. The new build is on schedule and the shop looks set to be completed mid-March. We hope to stock lots of sundries such as seeds, tools and, of course, our lovely plants. We will be able to sell house plants year-round, continuing on from our pop-up shop. We look forward to welcoming everyone in next

Spring.
