



Welcome everyone to the first newsletter of this year, slightly later than our usual summer edition. This year we celebrate our 30th birthday and we had thirty events planned in honour of this milestone.

Sadly, this was not to be as we joined the rest of the nation in lockdown. Our Volunteers were asked to stay home and keep safe, some staff were furloughed while a skeleton staff kept the plants alive and the cats fed. As with many other horticulturally based businesses, the timing of the pandemic was particularly challenging as spring is our busiest time and the sale of plants helps enormously with the costs of running the charity. We were very fearful of the future in those early days but thanks to local and national charitable trust funds, many of which were made available to mitigate the effects of Covid-19, and the generosity of our many loyal supporters we were able to weather the storm and recoup some of our losses.



During lockdown we worked very hard to try and maintain the community spirit of care and support we enjoy at Cherry Tree. We quickly learned to use social media and video conferencing so we could meet in the virtual world and for those of us that prefer more conventional methods, we spoke regularly on the telephone ensuring that nobody felt isolated. This was a lifeline for many who otherwise would not have had contact during the long months in lockdown. Many of our Volunteers took up new hobbies and we share some pictures later in this newsletter.

The nursery shop reopened in the middle of May and we welcomed our customers back in the new socially distanced format. Our plants were looking beautiful and it was thrilling to see them finally leaving in packed trolleys. We have many new gardeners as customers, the benefits of gardening becoming more and more apparent as people re-engaged with their gardens and nature.

Our Volunteers returned in July, again in a very different and cautious setup following the 'bubble' system schools were using. They have adapted well to the new arrangements which consist of small socially distanced groups, working outside or in the polytunnels depending on the weather.

Mental health has been very prominent in the media with increasing numbers seeking help, many people experiencing mental illness for the first time. We all have a point where we simply cannot cope with all that life is throwing at us and this pandemic has affected people adversely in many ways for many reasons. The charity is seeing an increased number of new referrals and we aim to help as many people as possible.







While no one knows what the future holds, we remain optimistic and prepared to face the challenges ahead. This year we have been unable to celebrate our 30th birthday and to hold any of our planned fundraising events, however not all is lost as one of our brave staff members, Nigel Short, took part in a wing walk at Compton Abbas Airfield on Friday 4th September. CHESTNUT NURSERY, THE YEAR SO FAR

During the winter months we were busy installing an irrigation system into the outside retail and polytunnel areas – with the Volunteers working hard to help dig trenches, lay pipes etc. The project was finished during lockdown and we now have an efficient irrigation system which helps to save time during

the busy season.

When the lockdown was put in place our Volunteers were busy potting and tending all the summer bedding which at the time was very small and tender. As they left the site to start the lockdown process two members of staff tended the plants and fortunately, we did not have to discard any of our stock. By the middle of April with demand for bedding plants and compost soaring we opened our online Web Shop – a first for Chestnut! This was hugely successful and kept our team of 4 working flat out processing, packing and delivering orders. After a few weeks we added a Click and Collect service which was also well received and introduced many new customers to our Nursery.

Throughout the lockdown we kept in touch with all of our Volunteers via a weekly telephone call. Everybody experienced lockdown differently - some Volunteers joined the Cherry Tree Volunteers' Facebook page which enabled them to keep in touch and share experiences; a group of Volunteers had a WhatsApp group so they could all 'chat' together; lots of decorating was done and music-making in the

Volunteers organised a get together to thank our Friends for all they have done during 2019. They put on a wonderful cream tea with home-made scones and cakes galore.




December 2019 Volunteer's Christmas Meal








February 2020 Volunteer's Soup Day

VOLUNTEERS' ACTIVITIES DURING LOCKDOWN

Our Volunteers coped with lockdown in different ways, here are just two of their stories.

Volunteer's lockdown story 'A'- I was off sick for 6 months with anxiety and depression last year. Those months were sheer misery for me, suffering with severe anxiety and depression. However, the unexpected 6 months off this year due to lockdown/furlough has been so different, in some ways being a weird awakening of what is important.

Everything seemed at a slower pace, no time deadlines, I felt relaxed and started to find things I wanted and enjoyed to do. I set up a potting table and began putting into practice things I had learnt

One thing that I really have enjoyed during my time in lockdown has been crafting, making greeting cards – each day I would wake up with inspiration and motivation – I would get up, get dressed, put on my make-up, do my hair as if I were going to work and settle down ready to work on my own little job. This behaviour was very unlike the year before, when I was ill nothing motivated me. This year I was actually strangely looking forward to each day, albeit well aware the world was suffering terribly and obviously watching the news and listening to the awful daily announcements

I hope to continue with this and make more cards to give to Cherry Tree for their fund-raising fayres

when they can recommence.











Volunteer's lockdown story 'B' - When the lockdown first started, I felt a bit anxious as I just had built up my confidence a bit more and started to come to Cherry Tree twice a week, and I felt like I had got a lot done. Then we all had to go to self-quarantine and started to feel the full impact of the lockdown. It wasn't too hard to bounce back from it in the beginning, I followed my routine of cup of coffee, smoothie, medication, yoga in the morning and then crafting, a lot of it.

One of the things my partner and I decided to do was build a new enclosure for Mr. Pickles, our little Chinese Water Dragon. We got him 2 years ago this August 29th to help me improve my mental

health and get back to routine when I was at my lowest.


He loves cuddles and kisses. I do not recommend kissing any odd dragons though if you don't know

for a fact that you can trust them not to try to bite your nose!


